Speech by H.E. SHINOHARA Katsuhiro, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Japan to the Kingdom of Cambodia On the Occasion of the Inauguration Ceremony of the New Building of the National Institute of Statistics, Ministry of Planning

The construction of this building is also part of Japan's focus on contributing towards the improvement of statistical data in Cambodia. I sincerely hope that the new facility will serve as a focal point for collecting and analyzing statistical data for the entire nation. As a Japanese citizen, I am especially pleased that Japan is extending meaningful, albeit small, cooperation towards this objective.

Looking back on history, it is worth noting that Cambodia and Japan have a long history of such cooperation. This year marks the 55th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two countries. It is a great pleasure for me today to attend and celebrate this opening ceremony with H.E. Mr. AKIBA Kenya, since his visit is the first one by a Japanese parliamentarian this year. In fact, Cambodia-Japan relations can be traced back to the 17th century. As we celebrate the opening of this facility today, I strongly hope that mutual understanding, at both governmental and personal levels, will be further enhanced through people-to-people exchange, including technical assistance.

I would like to conclude my speech by humbly requesting guidance from Excellency Mr. SAR Kheng and Excellency Mr. CHHAY Than to ensure that the new facility will be maintained in good condition and utilized for the forthcoming Population Census in 2018. I would like to express once again my heartfelt appreciation to all the people who have worked towards the successful inauguration of this building.
