4.3.3 Literacy and Educational Level of Economically Active Youth

Literacy and educational attainment of economically active population is an important factor of economical development for every country. Cambodia has achieved remarkable improvement in the sector of education. However, though regrettable, the educational level of Cambodia is still improving at present. The analytical report of the Census 2008 covers a topic on literacy and education. The basic information about educational condition of Cambodia is analyzed in that particular report. The educational issue related to the economic activity is reviewed in this section.

LITERACY


Table 4.15 shows the literacy of the economically active youths. The difference in the proportion of being literate among economically active youths between employed youths and unemployed youths is insignificant in 1998. But the proportion of being literate among employed females is lower than that among unemployed females from 1 percent point to 5 percent points in each age group.

In 2008, the proportion of being literate among all the economically active youths is greater than that in 1998 in general. The proportion of being literate among employed youths and employed people who aged 25 - 34 is lower than that of unemployed counterparts. The exception is the age group of 15-19.

LEVEL OF EDUCATION

Educational level of Cambodia has been improving. Table 4.16 shows the educational level of economically active and literate youths. Educational level of both sexes has been improved during the decade, but the level of female education is still behind that of males in 2008.

Figure 4.11 shows the distribution of educational level of economically active and literate youths. It is easy to recognize that the level of education has been improving on the whole. The second and the third graphs of the Figure 4.11 show the difference in educational level between the two cohorts – the age groups of 15 - 19 and 20 - 24 in 1998.



These two cohorts at the Census 1998 pasted supposedly the age of completing compulsory education. But the proportion of 'Completed Primary School' has increased in the decade. This difference in the two cohorts indicates that most of them attained education during the period between 1998 and 2008 even though they were beyond the school age, which implies that the educational level of the people is associated with the improvement of educational environment and/or living condition.



Figure 4.12 shows the unemployment rate by literacy and by level of education. The unemployment rate has decreased during the decade. Although there is a difference in unemployment rate by literacy and level of education, it can be said that the unemployment rate of the younger half of youth (age 15-19) is the highest, and that the higher the unemployment rate is, the higher the level of education is (Figure 4.12).



SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

School attendance of the younger half of youths (age 15-20) is shown in Table 4.17. The proportion of the employed youths who have 'Never attended school' has greatly decreased from 1998 to 2008, and, the proportion of the employed youths who are 'Attending school now' has slightly decreased. Their status of school attendance has an inconsistency apparently. Since secondary and tertiary education in 2008 is more popular than a decade ago, generally speaking, the proportion of those attending school now should have increased in 2008. But in fact it has decreased. This implies that some youths who could not attend school in the past may be attending school at the time of the census enumeration.
